Several Cities in Danger of Losing State Shared Revenues

■he Oregon Department of Administrative Services (DAS) is reminding city managers and recorders to take the necessary steps prior to July 31 to receive quarterly state shared revenue payments. According to state records, an unusual number of cities have failed to file their certifications with DAS this year and are in jeopardy of not receiving per capita state liquor, cigarette and gas tax revenues.

Cities should have received documents (by email and mail) from DAS requesting that they:

- Pass an ordinance or resolution requesting state shared revenue money;
- · Hold public hearings before the budget committee and city council regarding the city's use of state shared revenues; and

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• Submit documentation, such as the <u>short form</u> distributed by DAS, certifying compliance and intent to receive tax revenues in fiscal year 2017-18.

Additionally, cities in counties with populations in excess of 100,000 inhabitants must certify that they provide at least four of the statutorily listed municipal services. All cities in Clackamas, Deschutes, Douglas, Jackson, Lane, Linn, Marion, Multnomah and Washington counties must submit a <u>separate certification</u>. Note that a separate new quarterly certification for state shared marijuana tax revenues will be required from cities, but that form is not yet available as legislation requiring it passed during the last week of session.

Amid Merger, LOC Joins Work Group on Urban Renewal

The League is participating in a series of work group meetings hosted by the House Committee on Economic Development and Trade in order to achieve consensus changes to the state's urban renewal statutes. The meetings are expected to continue throughout the interim, with a goal of preparing recommendations for the 2018 legislative session.

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During the just-completed session, an urban renewal bill (HB 2470) had one contentious hearing but did not advance. The League opposed the bill because the proposed changes would have threatened both city authority to manage urban renewal districts and the viability of using urban renewal as a key economic development tool. Thereafter, the committee began hosting the work group meetings. The first meeting identified statutory areas and urban renewal practices that stakeholders found problematic. Generally, concerns include urban renewal transparency, meaningful district formation input, permitted project usage of property tax revenues, duration of districts, and financial reports along with updates. The concerns came primarily from special districts and schools.

Key partners in the League's urban renewal advocacy efforts have been the Oregon Economic Development Association (OEDA) and the Association of Oregon Redevelopment Agencies (AORA). The League is a member of both organizations and holds an ex officio seat on OEDA's Board of Directors. Effective July 7, 2017, OEDA merged with AORA. The new organization will be organized under the OEDA name, with a robust Urban Renewal Committee and board representation. The merger acknowledges the importance of urban renewal as a key economic development tool and signifies a desire to strengthen economic development advocacy and training while providing efficiency for members. The League will continue to serve on the OEDA Board and the Urban Renewal Committee. Cities with merger questions are directed to contact OEDA President Jon Stark. State and Local Marijuana Tax Distributions Clarified

The following are clarifications for cities on the distribution of revenues of state and local marijuana taxes:

<u>State Tax</u>: HB 3470 passed during the final week of the legislative session, providing that state marijuana taxes collected from January 1, 2016 until July 1, 2017 will be distributed on a per capita basis to all incorporated cities without limitations. The city share of the state tax is 10 percent of the revenues, but administrative costs must first be deducted. The total estimated city share is \$7.86 million. Payments for these taxes are in September.

Cities that have prohibited any premises that requires a marijuana license will receive no share of state marijuana revenues for taxes collected after July 1, 2017. To get a share of those taxes,

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cities must certify quarterly with the Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC) that they do not prohibit the establishment of premises for which a marijuana license is required. The quarterly certification will be required because a city could either impose or lift a marijuana premises ban at any time. The OLCC certification process and form are in development, but cities will be notified of the new requirements. Once certified, distributions to cities will be 75 percent based on population, and 25 percent on licensure numbers in the city compared to the total licenses in all cities. The first quarter using this distribution ratio will be July - September 2017.

Local Tax: Local marijuana tax distributions began in June for cities that are using the Oregon Department of Revenue (DOR) for collection. A few cities collect a local marijuana tax on their own, but most use the DOR. The department keeps a list that is available here. City collection agreements with the DOR require confidentiality of taxpayer information, and that may include disclosure of the amount of taxes collected if there are a few marijuana retailers in a city. Cities should review their agreements and consult both their city attorneys and the DOR with confidentiality questions. The DOR collection agreement also provides that cities must update the DOR each quarter with information on the retailers in the city, including names and locations. The DOR will not withhold tax payments for failure to provide this update, but providing this information is in a city's best interest for tax liability purposes. Cities are in the best position to ensure locations are correctly credited to their tax jurisdiction. Lastly, to receive a marijuana tax distribution report that provides a breakdown on state and local taxes, penalties, interest and fees, cities need to submit proper paperwork to the DOR. This is a one-time requirement to verify confidentiality compliance. Many cities did not respond to the DOR prior to the June local tax disbursement, and thus did not receive the report with their payment. 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Applications Sought for LOC Board of Directors
