VISUAL IDENTITY

HOW TO USE THE CENTENNIAL SHIELD

The trademarked Oregon State Parks logo has been optimally designed to scale for applications both large and small. To ensure optimal reproduction the logo should not be reduced further than shown in the below example.

Select the logo color with a highest degree of legibility and contrast.

MAINTAIN GOOD CONTRAST FOR READABILITY

HOW NOT TO USE THE CENTENNIAL SHIELD

Legibility and consistency are vital in maintaining the character and identity for the Oregon State Parks centennial shield.

Do not attempt to re-create the elements of the shield or wordmarks.

Always use the approved artwork, and always follow these rules when using it.



DO NOT

OVERLAP OR ADD **ILLUSTRATION OR GRAPHICS TO THE** SHIELD.



DO NOT

PLACE THE LOGO ON A BACKGROUND THAT COMPROMISES LEGIBILITY OR READABILITY.



DO NOT

SCALE THE LOGO TOO SMALL.



DO NOT

STACK THE SHIELD WITH OTHER LOGOS.



DO NOT

THE BRAND PALETTE (SOLID BLACK, OR SOLID WHITE ARE ALSO OK)

MESSAGING

Theme: Oregon's state parks are timeless, special, and for everyone.

A hundred years ago, state parks were barely an idea in Oregon, little more than patches of roadside greenery. A 5-acre donation in 1922—setting aside a special place for everyone—became Oregon's first official state park. From 1922 to 1989, Oregon's state park system grew within the Oregon Department of Transportation and its predecessor agencies. Oregon Parks and Recreation officially became an independent agency in 1990 with much fanfare and public engagement.

The Centennial campaign is grouped into four core messages. They were selected to inform Oregonians and Oregon State Park users of our Centennial, and thank them for their continued support and good stewardship.


VOICE
