Dear Secretary Chao:

I am writing this letter on behalf of the Greater Eastern Oregon Regional Solutions Advisory Board to express our support of the City of John Day's application to the U.S. Department of Transportation's Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) program. The City's grant request would support the City's broader John Day Innovation Gateway plan that is seeking to reverse the economic decline that the community has faced since the loss of timber jobs over twenty years ago. Specifically the grant would aim to integrate a new connected grid of streets and trails with development possibilities, including housing, office space and recreational uses.

The City of John Day is a distressed rural community that has experienced a number of socio-economic problems including the highest unemployment rate in Oregon since 2012, low real market property values and assessed values and a struggle to find sufficient revenue to fund basic public services. The City of John Day's strategy is to reverse the pattern of population and economic decline by achieving a modest and sustainable growth rate, which will be supported by this grant's funding of critical transportation infrastructure.

BUILD grant funds will be used to extend Seventh Street from Northwest Bridge Street to Northwest Patterson Bridge Road to connect to the north side of the City, along with a network of trails along the John Day River and adjacent natural areas. Most importantly, this project will give the City of John Day three bridges to the north side of the city compared to the one bridge they currently have. This will not only relieve congestion but it will improve emergency vehicle access. This project has been planned and developed through the Transportation Growth Management grant program funded by the Oregon Department of Transportation and the Oregon Department of Land and Conservation Development.

Regional Solutions is an economic and community development collaborative based in the Governor's office and including state community development agencies. We work with the private sector, foundations, and local, state and federal government to coordinate and leverage

public investments to address regional priorities for Eastern Oregon. The Greater Eastern Oregon Regional Solutions Advisory Board has worked closely with the City of John Day over the past few years as they have developed their economic development strategy and Innovation Gateway project. The state has been a key funding partner in the City of John Day and while they are a small, rural community, they have proved to be a good investment and project manager. We believe that they would be an excellent example for other rural communities who are seeking to reverse the economic decline that so many of our rural communities are facing.

This award will support the rural economy of the City of John Day and eastern Oregon, and increase the economic competitiveness of the region. Thank you for your consideration of this request.

#### Dear Secretary Chao:

We write today to express our support of the City of John Day's application for funding for the John Day Innovation Gateway Economic Revitalization project utilizing the Department of Transportation's Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) program.

This project is focused on enhancing regional connectivity and safe, efficient infrastructure, which are critical foundations for a thriving economy. The application by the City of John Day requests funds for developing a network of streets that will support a diversity of uses in addition to driving, such as public transit, walking, and biking.

The Innovation Gateway Economic Revitalization project is needed to help activate John Day's main street, boost the local economy, provide access to workforce housing, and replace deteriorating bridges. With BUILD funding, John Day will develop new parking areas on Main Street; improve local streets and an intersection; construct bridges that will provide access for walkers and bikers; and restore an existing bridge so that emergency vehicles will be able to cross. Bridge improvements will have the added benefit of increasing flood resilience for the community. In addition, funds from the BUILD grant would be used to construct turn-lanes from Highway 26 into the John Day Innovation Gateway and will assist with the parking and driveways for the Gateway's future event center, distillery, and hotel. In summary, these changes will improve the experiences of local residents and visitors alike.

The goals of this project are consistent with the intent of the BUILD program to fund high-impact transportation investments that increase access to safe and affordable transportation; facilitate economic growth and competitiveness; contribute to environmental sustainability; and promote regional connectivity. An investment in the City of John Day's project is an investment in Oregon's economic future.

Dear: Secretary Chao;

The Oregon Department of Transportation Region 5 encompasses that eastern third of Oregon. We partner with 46 Cities and nine different Counties to develop and maintain a multimodal transportation system that connects people and helps Oregon's communities and economy thrive. Through these interactions, we have a long standing relationship with the City of John Day and support their request for assistance through the USDOT BUILD Transportation Discretionary Grant Program to improve and develop key multimodal transportation infrastructure.

To provide context for this request and why we support the John Day Innovation Gateway project, it is important to understand the economy and history of Eastern Oregon. The Eastern Oregon economy is strongly dependent upon natural resource industries such as farming, livestock production and timber. Some communities we serve are located in areas that are well served by a mix of transportation types such as freeway, marine transport and rail. Those economies have been able to diversify and reduce reliance on natural resource industries. Other communities are more restricted and have had a historic reliance on single industries. That has been a challenge for more rural communities as they adapt to a post-timber economy. When natural disasters occur, such as the Federal Disaster declared for the 2019 Floods in Oregon, it affects these communities, including John Day, much harder.

The City of John Day has been forward thinking and innovative in their plans to recover from past economic hardships to become a thriving and resilient community. They have planned for a future in taking a large abandoned industrial property and repurposing it to create key economic assets that will sustain John Day's economy going forward. This is a big change, but has been developed by the community with strong support from the citizen and many partners (including private partnerships of approximately 7 million dollars), who are excited to see the vision of creating jobs and community through their effort to provide:

- Broadband expansion and network modernization
- Workforce Housing
- Innovation Gateway Industrial Site and Grid Modernization
- Hotel and Event Center/ Distillery development
- Flood Mitigation and Environmental Restoration
- Community Pavilion
- Hydroponic Greenhouse Learning Center

To support this larger vision, important multimodal investments are needed. This BUILD request will construct three new miles new street improvements, including new streets, an intersection, repairing and repurposing a bridge for pedestrian river crossing and new multimodal bridges over the John Day River that will serve vehicles, pedestrians, and transit. The street network will be expanded to provide transportation in a number of forms to previously inaccessible or underserved parts of John Day. Specifically the improvements associated with the BUILD grant include:

- 5,400 linear feet of new arterial streets
- 6,282 linear feet of new collector streets
- 3,354 linear feet of new local streets
- One intersection safety improvement project
- Structural improvements to an existing (out of service) bridge to return it to use for bikes, pedestrians,
   and emergency/service vehicles
- One new bridge for vehicles, bikes and pedestrian
- Two new bridge for bikes, pedestrians and transit stops
- Two new downtown parking areas in the down town area.

Each of these individual elements of the project proposal are valuable improvements to John Day community. Together, each of these project components combine to implement a strong, multi-faceted transportation infrastructure strategy that will help John Day recover economically and thrive going forward. ODOT has partnered with Oregon's Department of Land Conservation and Development and the City of John Day on a recently adopted Transportation Growth Management (TGM) plan that identified a wide range of transportation needs for this portion of the community and make prioritized transportation improvements associated with the proposed project. With this background work completed, and private public partnerships in place, we strongly support this application and the improvements that would result from this important work. This is a project that will bring vital economic recovery and livability to John Day and if awarded, will be a highly visible and successful example of how the US Department of Transportation can help communities develop a well-planned and much needed transportation network. Thank you for your consideration of this project request.
