
Public Safety Departments

- Three departments in FY18-19
 - Police (4 FTE)
 - Fire (13 Volunteers + Paid Chief)
 - 9-1-1 Dispatch (5.5 FTE transitioned on January 1, 2019)
- Public safety spending in FY17-18 = \$1,019,632
 - Police = \$422,840
 - Fire = \$173,676
 - 9-1-1 Dispatch = \$423,116




20-Year Summary of Public Safety Spending


Spending Increases \$23K per year on average






Property Index Crime Rate





9-1-1 Transition Update

- All 9-1-1 staff employed by Grant County Emergency Communications Agency effective January 1, 2019
- Lease agreement for 911 use of fire hall fully executed
- Completed inventory of dispatch equipment left at city hall
- Completed furniture installation and majority of building improvements for new emergency communications center
 - Fiber optic installation scheduled (Blue Mountain Telecom)
 - Building security installation scheduled (cameras and mag locks)
- Communications cut over to new 911 Center scheduled for week of March 4 (pending fiber testing and validation)
